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The Guam Preservation Trust (GPT) was

created as a nonprofit public corporation in 1990 by Public Law 20-151 and re-codified in 2004 by Public Law 27-89. Its mandated purposes are:

- · To seek outside grants and donations;
- To acquire title to threatened Guam properties for the preservation of their historical value, whether in fee simple, by leasehold, or by easement, and whether through donation, transfer, dedication or purchase;
- To award grants for

Historic property documentation and historic register nomination; Architectural and archaeological history and documentation of historic structures and sites;

Protection of historic structures and sites through stabilization, rehabilitation, reconstruction, or restoration, including lighting when appropriate on such sites being utilized for non-profit and non commercial purposes, such as private homes, schools, churches, public buildings and facilities;

Ethnography and oral history of Guam;

Archival and archaeological research and investigations for locating, recording and protecting sites of historic or prehistoric interest or value.

 To support other activities directly related to increasing the public appreciation of, and benefit from historic places including public interpretation and presentation.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Guam Preservation Trust presents the 2023 Year End Review in celebration of the resiliency and recovery from the devastating disasters of the pandemic and typhoons (2020 – 2023). In 2020, the Guam Preservation Trust recognized the uncertainties of the pandemic and immediately shifted operations and programs to austerity measures in preparation for the inevitable repercussions from the pandemic. A new policy (Teleworking) was established to address the working conditions of our greatest assets – our employees.

In 2021 -2022, the Guam Preservation Trust realized the global crisis and its effect on Guam's overall economic stability and its trickle effect on the Trust's finances. This shifted our focus on diversifying our revenue sources with efforts to seek other funding opportunities.

In late May of 2023, Typhoon Mawar brought devastation to the island and all Trust programs and projects were once again hampered. Amid all the crisis and planning, staff and stakeholders managed to provide seamless transitions of programs and projects to our communities.

In early June, the Guam Preservation Trust rose out of its crisis mode and into its recovery period with incredible strides:

- The Trust welcomed the funding infusion of \$3.5million from the Guam Legislature to rehabilitate the F. Q. Sanchez School;
- The passage of public law 36-107 to restore 100% of revenues from Building Permit Fees;
- The increase in interest income on investments;
- The increase in approvals from federal funding opportunities;
- The planning and implementation of the Trust's Three-Year Growth Plan.

The most significant achievement during our recovery period were the Trust's great foresight and community collaboration.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Revenue

The Guam Preservation Trust is financially stable with total assets of over \$16million and a revenue source from Building Permit Fees that averages \$500,000.00 to over \$900,000.00 annually. In 2023, the Guam Preservation Trust received a total of \$1,356,166.25 (actual) of which \$1,050,000.00 was collected from Building Permit Fees and the remaining from grants and donations.

Investments

The Guam Preservation Trust investment program is sound and on point with its expectations as indicative when compared to the DOW Jones Closing (Figure 1). With investment value of over \$5million, the program revenue from interest on investments totaled \$128,520.75 (accrued) for 2023 (Figure 2).



OFFICE OF PUBLIC ACCOUNTABILITY

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Guam Preservation Trust - FY 2022 Financial Highlights

The Office of Public Accountability (OPA) released the Guam Preservation Trust (GPT) financial statements, report on compliance and internal control, management letter, and the auditor's communication with those charged with governance for fiscal year (FY) 2022. Independent auditors Ernst & Young, LLP (EV) rendered an unmodified (clean) opinion on GPT's financial statements, for which no material weaknesses or significant deficiencies were identified. GPT closed the fiscal year with a net position of \$15.7 Million (M), a 30% increase from FY 2021. For FY 2022, OPA recognized GPT for achieving a status similar to "low-risk" for five consecutive years.

Revenues Increased by \$3.7M GPT's total revenues increased by 509%, from \$728 thousand (K) in FY 2021 to \$4.4M in FY 2022. The revenues consisted of building permit fees, grants and other support, and interest earned on cash and investments balances.

For FY 2022, GPT collected \$805K from building permit fees, which was a 44% increase from FY 2021. Construction activity attributed solely to the increase in FY 2022 involved either large hotel developments or as small renovations on homes or existing small structures.





Under Guam Public Law 36-82, GPT received \$3.5M for the rehabilitation of the historic Francisco Q. Sanchez Elementary School in the village of Humåtak. This \$3.5M appropriation makes up 79% of GPT's total revenues.



Investment Activity
Although investments increased by 52% from \$1.5M in FY 2021 to \$2.2M in FY 2022, the interest income on investments of \$27K in FY 2022 had a less than 1% decrease from FY 2021. The slight decrease is attributed to the volatile market and drawdowns during the year.

Expenditures Increase by \$110K
In FY 2022, total expenditures amounted to \$857K, a 15% increase from FY 2021. This increase is attributed to the \$82K increase in personnel.

Management Letter

A separate management letter from EY identified three matters and recommended that GPT:

1) review its travel policy to ensure that all publicly funded off-island travel is reported on a all required detail, for all travel that occurred in FY 2022:

2) comply with the per diem rates posted by the U.S. General Services Administration and also include specific provisions for hotel costs paid in excess; and of provisions for hotel costs paid in excess; and for business use only.

GUAM PRESERVATION TRUST FIVE-YEAR STRATEGIC PLAN

2023 OUTCOMES

2023 is the first year of the Five-Year Plan that was developed by about one hundred community stakeholders as a bold statement towards taking action to preserve and protect Guam's heritage for all to benefit.

Over a dozen action initiatives/outcomes were implemented to address proposed outcomes for the year. These action initiatives include historic structures/capital projects, historic sites assessments/inventories, programs, sponsorship for community education and outreach, and involvement in island-wide planning and development programs. A total of over \$4.3 million have been obligated for these projects and programs.

HISTORIC STRUCTURES CAPITAL PROJECTS

Capital projects are historic structures that have been listed in Guam and/or National Register of Historic Places and are undergoing the phases of preservation treatments (Historic Structures Report, Architectural and Engineering Design, and construction phases). Although some projects may have been approved a year or two before 2023, project implementation phases continue well into 2023:




